

The Summer Reading Challenge: Ready, Set, Read!

Launching Saturday 8 July and finishing on Saturday 23 September, this year's Challenge is a fantastic celebration of imagination, reading, and being active. Click here to watch the video!


The Summer Reading Challenge 2023 theme is "Ready, Set, Read!" and has been developed in partnership with the Youth Sports Trust. The Challenge will encourage children to engage in games and sports in any way that suits them bests.

The Summer Reading Challenge, presented by The Reading Agency and delivered by libraries, encourages children aged 4 to 11 to continue reading throughout the summer holidays, trying to prevent the reading "dip". The aim of the Challenge is to read up to 6 books, collecting special stickers and rewards along the way. Children will need to be a member of the library to sign up for the challenge but joining the library does not take long and is free. All reading counts Including audiobooks, eBooks and eComics!

Children can also take part in the online Challenge from The Reading Agency this summer. Go to their website <u>Summer Reading Challenge</u>, and children can set their own goals, rate and review their books to unlock badges, play games and enter competitions.



How can I help my child?



When we teach reading comprehension in school, we focus on these areas when we ask questions about a text. It might be useful to choose an area to focus on each week when you read with your child.

V- vocabulary. Which key word tells you about the character/

setting/mood?

Can you find a word that means...?

I- Inference How can you tell that....(this character is angry)?

How do these words make the reader feel?

P- Predict What might happen next? Why do you think that?

Do you think x will happen? Why/why not?

E- Explain Why is this text arranged in this way?

What is the author's point of view?

How does the author engage the reader?

R- Retrieve Who had...? Who is...? Who did....?

How would you describe this story/text? What genre

is it? How do you know?

S– Sequence Can you number these events 1-5 in the order that

they happened?

- Summarise Can you summarise in a sentence the opening/

middle/end of the story?
