Headteacher's Letter

Dear Parents,

I hope everyone woke up this morning with their homes still intact after last night's stormy weather. It seems we were fortunate compared to other parts of the country. Our Year 1 pupils did experience some rain yesterday during their visit to Windsor Castle as part of their learning. However, I am pleased to hear that the wet weather did not dampen their spirits. I was thrilled to learn how impressed the castle staff were with the children and their exemplary learning behaviours. They were wonderful ambassadors for the school!

I would like to apologise for the technical issue that occurred on Monday with the Parents' Evening bookings. Although we had set everything to go live as planned, a glitch in the system appears to have published the slots earlier than expected. We're sorry if this caught you off guard (it did for us too!). Hopefully, everyone was able to make arrangements, but if you experienced any issues, please let the office know, and they will do their best to accommodate you.

Next week, the school will close on Wednesday for an INSET day. In the morning, we will focus on reviewing our vision for pupils in the modern world, receiving vital special educational needs training, rolling out first aid training, and beginning training for all staff on the school's new management information system. After February half-term, the school will transition all its systems to BROMCOM, in line with other schools in our Trust. This change requires important training, but we are confident it will bring significant benefits to both the school and parents as it is rolled out. Please keep an eye out for more information during the summer term.

Turning to what seems to be everyone's favourite gripe: this week, I have received numerous comments about how parents park in the village during pick-up and drop-off times. On the following page is a guide to parking near the school. However, I kindly ask everyone to be considerate to our neighbours: please avoid parking on grass verges or blocking driveways, and do not sit in your car with the engine running. This is incredibly harmful to the environment and detrimental to the health of the children (and adults) who must walk through the unnecessary fumes created.

Entry to the school will be via the rear doors only.


